We speak often during this Christmas season of joy. During the first week of my fall visit to HOINA, I found myself serving as host, along with the HOINA staff, to a group of visitors who experienced joy firsthand. Several dozen members of the Vishakhapatnam Rotary Club toured the campus with the idea of offering support to our programs. Rotary International involvement with HOINA is not something new. In the earlier years of the orphanage's existence, the Lancaster Northeast Rotary Club and the Guindy Rotary Club of Chennai were very supportive of our programs including writing a Rotary International grant to purchase two vans to transport our students, bunk beds for all of our dormitories, and generators to serve us during the many power outages and brownouts that occur in village India.

The local club in Chennai interacted with our children as their own uncles by visiting our home quite regularly, hosting many celebrations, and getting to know the children personally. So impressed were they with Darlene's efforts that they granted her the

Paul Harris Fellow award and made her an honorary member of Rotary International. So when the Vishakhapatnam Rotary Club arrived at our gates, we found much in common to talk about.

The Rotary members and their families brought gifts for the children. They seemed to glean as much delight from delivering the gifts as the children did by

receiving them. After a tour of the campus we sat down to a wonderful meal prepared by our kitchen staff under the supervision of Devi, our head cook at the girls' home, who created a meal that could easily have competed with the meals of the finest restaurants in India. To say that our guest ate heartily is an understatement.

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The meal was wonderful, and it was, no doubt, enjoyed by our guests. However, that fact alone did not so delight me. The meal was served by the older girls at the orphanage, and as I observed them responding to the needs of our guests, I was amazed at

their grace and maturity. Though we often have guests, it is rare to have so many at one time. Four of our six foot dining tables were placed end to end, and every seat was taken. I don't think our girls have ever served such a crowd before. Nevertheless,

unhurriedly they brought dish after dish—filling and refilling bowls, plates, and glasses. They were calm, poised, and magnificent. I looked on as a proud parent might look at his child's successes. Their mature accomplishment that day will be one of the memories that I will recall when I am home and think yearningly of HOINA.

As with many visitors who come to HOINA the first time, the Rotarians were amazed at our facilities. There are many orphanages in India, but all but a few are bleak and dispiriting places. I'm sure that a number of our Rotarian friends came with that "bleak orphanage" concept in their minds. That would have been dispelled quickly as they drove down the tree- and flowerlined drive to the girls' home. Some were literally stunned with what they saw and experienced: beauty, order, cleanliness and most of all the joy of our children. "This is an orphanage?" they might have thought. Yes it is an orphanage but more than that it is a home filled with love and concern for all who must be here. It was obvious to them all that we are in the business of providing comfort and security to children and young adults whose lives were far from secure before finding HOINA. Some tried to express to me how they felt, but they had difficulty putting it into words. I have that same difficulty when I am back in the U.S. and try to tell friends about HOINA, so I understood what they falteringly tried to say. Some joyous experiences are simply inexpressible.

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
