He said they would be inspired that I went back to school as an adult. I got a laugh out of everyone's faces when I told them my age and that I am a senior in college, graduating in the spring. They really found it funny when I told them I

am older than my professor, David Anna. (*Anna* means brother in Telugu.)

While I'll remember all of the children fondly, one particular HOINA student sticks out in my mind. His name is Richard, and he and I became good friends during my short visit to HOINA. My major in college is Professional Writing or in India, Journalism. My minors are Religious Studies and Photography. Richard has a serious interest in photography, and I was happy to allow him the use of my camera. During craft time I was so busy assisting the children that I was grateful when Richard grabbed my

camera and photographed the experience for me. On a few other occasions, I trusted Richard with my camera and was pleasantly surprised at the candid shots he took that I most likely would have never had the opportunity to capture myself. I promised Richard I would print some photos once I came home and mail them to him to give out to the children as mementos of York College's visit to HOINA.

Another fond memory I will always have of Richard is the evening he interpreted the story of David and Goliath for me during the boy's prayer meeting. As I was telling the story, I got into character and even referred

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to David's winding up of his sling shot much like how a cricket bowler winds up his pitch. Richard interpreted as I played up the story to keep the interest of the young boys, and I'm sure he was laughing with me, not at me! His sense of humor and intelligence will take him far in college and in life, no matter what career he pursues.

I understand that in India it would be difficult for someone who has passed the age of what is considered to be a typical student to return to study later in life. I feel blessed that I have had the opportunity to do so and

begin a new career. If I have learned nothing else in life, I have learned you are never too old to take in new information and grow from it. The experience at HOINA has done that for me. The children and the Christian values being taught to them have inspired me. While at HOINA I did an impromptu fundraiser by posting my writing on my personal website and my Facebook page, requesting donations for kitchen supplies. The response was overwhelming with so little planning or promotion.

The readers I have back in the United States donated over \$300 dollars to HOINA. I found this amazing as many of the people who responded didn't know me on a personal level, yet they were inspired by my stories and my pictures while I was in India and spending time at HOINA. During my stay I also learned the boys' cricket bat had broken, and they were playing with just one bat rather than the usual two. The funds generously donated by my friends and followers on my website were used to buy new knives, vegetable peelers, a sharpening stone, a small pressure cooker, cutting boards, kitchen shears, forks, spoons and serving spoons. They also covered the purchase of a cricket bat for the boys and to the girl's surprise, one for them, also! In addition to the bats,

both the boys and girls also received two cricket balls, and they were overjoyed. Their enthusiasm was clear on our last day at HOINA when the girls broke in their new cricket bat. Had the daylight never ceased, they would have played into the wee hours of the morning.

In addition to the kitchen equipment and the cricket bats, after several chats with Papa Large, I learned that the soy milk maker had broken. Having spent only \$70 of the money raised thus far, I readily offered the remaining balance to be used towards obtaining a new boiler for the "soy cow." Suprisingly, most of what I purchased are items that we take for granted in America and that make life at HOINA better and healthier. Helping raise the money for these simple items, I feel moved to continue writing about HOINA and raising funds for items needed at the home. Where there is a need, God will provide. Six months ago, I signed up for this course not knowing there would be a long-term purpose for traveling here. That purpose has been realized, and I feel God has moved me to continue spreading the word about HOINA and helping them with receiving the funds needed to continue the amazing work for orphans and teaching the word of our Lord.
