January 6th or Three Kings Day was quickly approaching which meant that 180 children would be receiving Christmas presents. When I heard that we would get to celebrate Christmas with the children, I was elated; however, before Three Kings Day, 180 presents would need to be wrapped.

Every child got a box with shampoo, soap, a comb, pencils, pens, sharpeners, talc, glue, washcloths, toothbrush, and toothpaste. The children also got one individual gift that they asked for. Many girls asked for purses, Bibles, books, and stuffed animals. The boys asked for soccer balls, watches, cars, books and stuffed animals. Many of these specialized presents would not fit into the first box, so for many of the children we would wrap two boxes.

After two days, we had finally finished wrapping all of the presents, and they looked AMAZING! All the wrapping paper was exactly the same but a variety of beautiful colors. The wrapping paper was one size fits all, so there were some gifts that needed two pieces of wrapping paper.



January 6th finally arrived with much anticipation, and we started to get ready for the celebration. The stage was set with tables surrounding it. After a few trips of carrying boxes, we got all of the presents onto those tables. All the children from both the boys' and girls' home were brought to the stage to celebrate. During the celebration, the children put on a program for us. Not only did they sing different songs in English and Telugu, but they also danced for us.

Coming to India, I had heard many stories about orphaned children and how sad and depressing the trip was going to be; however, these children were anything but sad. Although some had some hard upbringings and backgrounds, the smiles on their faces on Three Kings

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Day was enough evidence that they are some of the happiest children I have ever come in contact with.

The smiles and laughter of the children every day we were there was indescribable. One by one the children's names were called and the children came and accepted the Christmas present they were given.

With more patience than I have ever seen, the children waited as all of their brothers and sisters got their

gifts before any of them opened theirs. Before it was time to open the presents, we had two birthdays to celebrate, so the children sang the four verse birthday song. (Yes, 4 verses).

After the children had cake, they went back to the girls' and boys' homes, where they each opened their gifts. The smiles on their faces said it all. It did not matter what they got in those boxes; they were just happy to have something to open.

Celebrating the holidays with the children at HOINA has given me a whole new outlook on the holidays. These children enjoy spending time with each other with or without presents and that is more than

enough for them. I know that this year, my Christmas will not just be about opening presents. It will be about making memories, being together with my friends and family, and sharing stories with the people who mean the most to me. Understanding that a gift means more when it is well thought out and that a gift that comes from the heart is more valuable than a very expensive gift are important lessons that I learned while at HOINA.


