It was a cold January day. My sister Letti and I slid down the snowy hill from school. The snow was packed down from everyone who had been sliding on pieces of cardboard. "Hurry, Sis, Mum will wonder why we're late."


When we arrived at 618 Monongahela Avenue, we climbed wearily up the three flights of stairs to our apartment. The hallway was dark and cold. The year was 1947. Sis was ten, and I was eleven.

From the hallway, we could smell dinner wafting to us, warming us in thought if not actuality. As I rounded the corner into the kitchen, Mummy stood stirring the soup. Something was wrong. As she stirred, her tears rolled down her cheeks and some splashed into the soup pot. "Mummy, what's wrong?" we asked.

"They killed my hero."

"They killed your hero? Who was he?"

"Oh, Honey, you don't know him. He lived in a faraway land called India. His name was Mahatma Gandhi. The people in India think he belongs to them, but God gave him to the whole world. You see, God wants us to live in peace and to

love each other. That's one of the lessons Gandhi taught us. He was so wonderful. But today, someone killed him. I never understood why they always kill the good people."

"That's easy, Mummy. They kill the good because they are bad men."

That day is seared into my memory. I think God used my mother to plant that first seed of love for India in my heart. Next year will be 40 years for me in service to India. One of our Indian board members said, "Mom, when we see you, we think, she looks like a foreigner; but inside she's an Indian mother. Keep up the good work."

This month, we will be preparing to celebrate Mahatma Gandhi's October 2nd birthday here in India. His message of peace and love has never been more needed on the Earth. We will teach it again and again to our HOINA boys and girls. Learning to live with some 100 brothers or 100 sisters can be a challenge, but we strive to teach as Jesus did to turn the other cheek.

I was really pleased to see the cooperative attitude of our girls for their younger sisters. Every evening at 7 PM they sit on the floor of their dormitories and sing songs and entertain one another. Each class performs songs for their HOINA sisters. There are 25 girls in each dormitory room. Afterward, when the little ones go to sleep, the older teens meet for a short prayer time. Often your names are on our prayer list. They

On this trip, we are building the Nesbitt-Ranji vocational school. This project will take some time, so you can expect to see it mentioned in coming newsletters. We are also adding store rooms on top of our orphanage homes. Mahesh, our contractor is working on a cement driveway around our 24acre campus. We hope to not have to endure too many more months with muddy, rutted driving during the rainy season. Additionally, our HOINA children will be able to ride their bicycles in a safe environment. They'll pretend they are on a mini-racetrack!

While the weather is still hot here, it is good to be back and to have positive things to report to you. Many thanks to those of you who bought our girls pajamas. They love wearing them and all of the children love their new toys and bicycles. Everyone is doing well in school, which started on June 1.

Caitlin Carmody arrived last month and has been a huge blessing to all of us. She came the first time with the York College group led by Dr. David Fyfe earlier this year. If you missed her article, you can access it under the News link on our website. Hers was in the March 2014 issue.

One of our managers and I reminisced over the past twentythree years. We remembered when nearly 75 of us lived in mud
