Even the little ones loved to proudly wear their names. Finally, I got to know their names. Using their names, such a small bit of personal recognition, brought the biggest smile to their faces. We smiled often while we played games like cat's cradle and jacks for hours and hours of fun.

I also brought colored tissue paper to make paper flowers. I had brought enough paper for 100 girls, but since there were only 20 I let them make as many paper

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flowers as they wished. To say we had an abundance of paper flowers is an understatement. I found it interesting how many different colors the girls used, and not typical color combinations an American girl might select. Some flowers included browns and blacks and navy blue. The girls put them on their braids and wrists, tied them in bouquets, hung them on their bunks. Flowers were everywhere!

For the boys I bought two new cricket bats. Their faces lit up, and they proudly carried the bat cases around until it was time to open them. Immediately, they started pretending to hit the ball. They rubbed the bats to feel how smooth the wood was, and they smelled them, too. It reminded me of how our boys in the USA do the same with their baseball bats.

I also brought the boys the popular USA game UNO. Perhaps you are familiar with this classic card game: Rather than four suits, the card deck

At first the boys were a little shy, and we started out with only three players. Then more started to gather around, and then more. By the time we were done, all the boys were playing together. It turned out to be a daily event where we all played. Who knew that every day we could have so much fun and lots of laughs with such a simple game? Summer vacations look the same around the world.

The music teacher, Rosemary and her husband, Prasad continue the music lessons during the break. As a treat they invited all of us—children and staff—to their home for dinner. I was amazed at their generosity. We all piled into a little bus and traveled down the bumpy Indian roads. When we arrived, we enjoyed some singing and prayer in their home. Later we went up to the flat roof, where it was cooler, and had our little feast. I was impressed with our hostess and host. The children felt special, but I thought it was an especially nice treat for the staff. Rosemary has a beautiful voice and is a special blessing to HOINA.

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The campus is looking as good as ever. The vocational school is finished and tailoring classes have begun, giving local women nice career opportunities. Enrollment is up to around 45 students already, which is great news. Many new flowers have been planted all over the campus, flooding the campus with color. Those bright colors define (to me) Darlene Large. When I think of HOINA and Darlene, I think of the bright colors she has spread across the campus and her cheeriness while she is there. I truly believe there is no place on Earth she'd rather be. After my recent visit, I completely understand.


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# **HOINA Welcomes New Furry Friends**
