Walls Fall Down When the Floods Come Up

News from our HOINA campus is full of problems and praises. September saw Cyclone Gulab making landfall directly in the Visakhapatnam vicinity where over 11 inches of rain fell in a 24hour time period. From the coast, the deluge moved inland where HOINA took a direct hit. The storm had gale force wind speeds up to 62 mph, similar to a tropical storm in the Western Hemisphere. The pouring rains filled the ponds that many locals have on their properties, which overflowed and headed into the canal that cuts across the HOINA campus. The top photo shows the water at its worst.

Unlike 2014's Cyclone HudHud, which caused HOINA to lose doors, windows, some out-building roofs and 291 trees; the main impact this year from Cyclone Gulab is the toppling of 80 feet of the concrete wall that surrounds HOINA's acreage (bottom photo). I took the 71E bus from our village to the Jewel Box Restaurant. I went in to collect my mail from Mr. Razak, the owner of Blue Diamond Hotel and then ate my breakfast of idlis with jam and papaya. As I came out of the door, a bus nearly hit three small boys about three, five, and seven years of age. They moved quickly to avoid the large

wheels that advanced menacingly towards their small, emaciated bodies. I dashed over to them and asked them to sit on the front steps of the restaurant. When I did, the waiter came outside. I ordered papaya, juice, paratha, and curry.

He said, "Bring them inside, Madam." I did. We sat at a table. I worried that they might dirty the seats since they weren't wearing any underpants—just shirts. They inhaled their food, and I remembered to order them milk.

"Milk, Madam?" asked the waiter with a surprised look on his face.

"Milk," I replied in a strong, firm voice. He brought the hot cups of milk, and within a second or two they had emptied their cups.

I hadn't noticed him. He came over to me and said, "I told my cousin here, 'Watch that lady. She'll feed those children."

He asked them where they lived. Two had a father; the little one had a mother. All were semi-orphans who lived one and a half hours away in a small village. Their grandmother was around the corner at the bus stop, begging. We took a parcel of food and set off to find her.

They walked behind me begging a coin as people passed us by. At

the first bus stop they said their grandmother was far away. By this time, a crowd began to gather and watch us. Finally the crowd called a policeman. Who knows what they thought. I could only think that I was not interested in spending my day in the police station. I'd spent two hours with the boys already, and I had other work to do. I climbed into an auto-rickshaw and went to the train station. I thought as I drove off and looked through the back window, you win some and you lose some. I tried.... I realized it didn't matter if the boys had led me on a wild goose chase. I had done the important thing that I was directed to do for that moment. When we are a blessing to those in need, we find our blessing.


