

Sponsors Give More than Just Money

Once upon a time, HOINA had boys and girls living together in one home in India, outside of Chennai, where people speak Tamil. The boys eventually moved to a different property in Andhra Pradesh (A.P.) State while the girls remained in the first home HOINA built with the help of Lions Club International in the 1980s. The boys made the shift to speaking Telegu once they were settled in A.P. Eventually, HOINA purchased its current property of 20+ acres outside of Visakhapatnam and built a home where the boys could live. While the boys lived in that building, HOINA expanded by constructing another home for the girls to inhabit on the same acreage. Ultimately, the boys moved to the mostly finished new home, and we moved the girls into the completed home the boys had been inhabiting. Read on to hear the tale of that move from last month's featured author, Roz Vinci, long-time sponsor and HOINA friend.

"After following the growth of HOINA for years, I saw a new need. In the year when HOINA's final move was to take place, I read in the news-

letter what a challenge it would be to move 100 kids and staff 500 miles north to a new state. I picked up the phone and asked [HOINA's Founder] Darlene Large if she could use some help. Within a week I was back in India for another trip. We were attempting this monumental task during India's summertime (read: 120° and 100% humidity). Wow!


"I went to the boys' home to ready the campus for the girls' arrival. I had been to India, but on my previous trips had only visited the girls' home in Tamil Nadu (T.N.) State. This trip would be my first time meeting the boys. They had already moved to the new (albeit not-quite-finished) building. I was given a few tasks, one of which was putting the library together in what would now be the girls' home. Without being asked the boys rushed to help me. We unpacked a trunk-load of books and put a library together. Ramesh was in the group of boys I had organized into a bucket brigade, of

sorts. I organized the boys to be shelving books by topic, just like a real library. We'd call out, 'Children's book!' or 'Science!' and the book would land in the hands of the boy shelving that section. We had great fun and great success.

"I bonded so much with Ramesh that I wanted to sponsor him in addition to Ishwarya [read that story in our January 2024 issue]; however, he already had a sponsor. Instead, we enjoyed one another's company while I was there, and I left India bonded to him in my heart. Although I am not Ramesh's official sponsor, I recognized his high intelligence and decided to finance his further education. I take pride in announcing that he graduated in the top of his class with a degree in Computer Engineering. He has placed in a good company and now is preparing his new life with a former classmate (and now fiancée), Pryanka. I so enjoy getting progress reports and video calls from them."

When HOINA children grow up or move out of our homes to rejoin family as their situation allows or when we lose a sponsor, we sometimes need to reassign a child to a new sponsor or a sponsor to a new child. After Ishwarya graduated, Roz's next sponsee was Sandyha. She had been Darlene Large's sister Letti Obradovich's HOINA child. When Dr. Obradovich passed away unexpectedly, an interesting incident plopped Sandyha in Roz's lap, quite literally. To hear Roz tell it: "I had made a trip to India to help Darlene move the girls from T.N. north to A.P. I saw Sandhya wandering her new campus, alone, and obviously very shy. I asked her if she would like to read a book

I am still amazed that out of the hundreds of books in that library, I was guided to read that book to her.

"Sandhya was practicing her English, as she also learned her new state language, Telegu. As we enjoyed getting to know one another, we spent time together every day, for a week, taking turns reading to one another. Through
